The Migrant Festival 19 – 22 August 2021



Ikon presents the third annual *Migrant Festival*. A four day programme mixing visual art, music, film and performance, it celebrates the contribution made by refugees and migrants to Birmingham and the UK, whilst bearing witness to the hardships and sacrifices involved.

The 2021 festival comprises digital and live events including performances by musicians curated by Celebrating Sanctuary Birmingham; our annual Soapbox event featuring quick-fire presentations from individuals and groups supporting migrants in the Midlands; talks with artists including Keith Piper with Robert Beckford and Osman Yousefzada with Sathnam Sanghera; plus a series of family events and guided tours.

This year's festival is closely linked with Osman Yousefzada's major new installation Infinity Pattern 1 at Selfridges Birmingham. The work is co-commissioned by Selfridges and Ikon, as is an instore exhibition and art trail which, along with new film, poetry and screenprints by Yousefzada, features the work of three Birmingham artists, Hira Butt, Farwa Moledina and Maryam Wahid, all informed by the experience of migration. Osman Yousefzada also curated Ikon's first Migrant Festival in 2018.

Talk and Screening – Keith Piper and Robert Beckford Thursday 19 August, 1pm-2pm Digital event, via Zoom Free, book online, suggested donation £5

Artist Keith Piper discusses his new digital video, A Ship Called Jesus (Redux) (2021) with Professor Robert Beckford, Director, Insitute of Climate and Social Justice, University of Winchester and Professor of Black Theology, The Queen's Foundation, Birmingham. Together they consider the complex relationship between people of African descent and Christianity, and the Blk Art Group's covert, sometimes nostalgic, sometimes antagonistic, relationship with Black Christianity. Firmament explores the movement of the Black Diaspora across sea, sky, and land. It stands as a music-based tribute to, and celebration of, the infinite passengers of the Ship Called Jesus. <u>Talk – Felicity Allen</u> Saturday 21 August, 5- 6pm This event takes place at Ikon Gallery Free, suggested donation £5

Felicity Allen discusses her collaborative process in front of the work *Baby II* (1989) currently displayed at Ikon Gallery. During *The Migrant Festival* 2021, Ikon screens Allen's new digital video, *Figure to Ground – a site losing its system* (2020) commissioned as part of *People Like You: Contemporary Figures of Personalisation*. Through portraiture, Allen considers this shifting sense of self in relation to data science with her sitters, who are selected because of their interest in and relationship to digital culture, or to portraiture and archiving, or to issues of borders and locality (including refugee status). Several sitters are involved with *Refugee Tales*, which stems from Gatwick Detainees Welfare Group and Kent Refugee Help, and calls for a future without immigration detention.
