

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ACTIVITY





This activity pack is designed for creative learning at home or school. Created by artists Navkiran Kaur Mann and Hipkiss & Graney, it aims to encourage children and young people to think critically about art and engage in dialogue about our cultural history and collective futures.

Produced to coincide with the Coronation of King Charles III, the activities explore themes of humanity, interconnectedness and ecologies—reflecting The Monarch's commitment to supporting young people's futures and action against climate change.













ABOUT THE ARTISTS



Navkiran Kaur Mann is a spoken word poet and writer based in Coventry. They are committed to using writing and spoken word to speak about gender equality, the un-silencing of South Asian voices, mental health and faith.

The activity in this pack is designed to flex participants' poetry writing skills through imagining themselves as a king or queen. It encourages young people to consider their own culture and identity, and unpicks some of the symbols we will see in the Coronation, asking what would you do in a position of power?





Imagine you are a king or queen. **Draw how you might look.**



Since 1661, every Coronation has featured an orb. **An orb** symbolises power. Decorate and colour in the orb.



Think about the power associated with an orb. If you governed a kingdom, what rules would you have around fairness and justice?


Write a poem that starts with 'If I ruled a kingdom I would...'
Think about using simple rhyme.

Rhyme is when two words sound the same. For example, king rhymes with sing, ring, thing, bring, wing. You don't have to rhyme each line—try and rhyme every other line or two.


Here's one I've written:

What do you love most about nature? What environmental issues are you most passionate about?


Write a free writing poem about saving the planet.

HIPKISS & GRAINEY BANNERS OF MYCELIA


Mycelium


Now, close your eyes... Imagine you are a carbon nutrient standing inside the mycelium network.




Smaller organisms too, closer to your size, walk silently beside you. These are called **Protozoa**.

Above your head, you hear the far-off boom of a great beast slowly lower one of its mighty legs to the earth. These are **Arthropods**.




Draw your ideas down. Are your banner designs wild and complex, mysterious and curious, are they like ancient pictures painted on a cave wall?
