


# Explore Ikon's First Floor Galleries



Find *Passionate Pilgrim*. The mirrors are used in a performance by Melati with a group of women activists. It explores the working conditions and identity of migrant domestic workers. The women use the mirrors to look at their reflections and to communicate with each other and the audience.



Look in a mirror and draw your reflection. Around your self-portrait, draw or write ways in which you can help others.

Find the film *Exergie-Butter Dance*. Watch as Melati slowly dances on blocks of butter. Her movements squash the butter, causing her to slip, fall and lift herself up. The artist compares these three movements to a haiku – a Japanese form of poetry with three lines. A haiku has five syllables in the first line, seven in the second and five in the third.

Can you write a haiku about dancing on butter? For example: I danced on butter, And I tumbled to the ground, Greasy, I got up.





Find *I'm a Ghost in My Own House*. For this performance, Melati grinds blocks of charcoal with a stone rolling pin for 12 hours. The work reflects her feelings of isolation when returning to Indonesia after living in Germany for many years.

Draw or write things you can do to help the planet:


